Traffic Citations / Traffic Accidents

Since 2020, we have an average of 18 crashes per year, which we had 18 crashes in 2024. In 2024, issued 184 warnings for various traffic offenses and 22 State of Minnesota citations issued and 3 City of Starbuck administrative citations issued. SPD officers had 214 total traffic stops and gave out warnings on 86% of the traffic stops. SPD officers made 5 DWI arrests in 2024, which since 2020 we have an average of 7 per year.



MINNESOTA TOWARD ZERO DEATHS (TZD)



The Starbuck Police Department also participated the TZD Enforcement Grant Program which provides federal funds to law enforcement agencies to conduct enhanced enforcement. We have participated in the TZD program since 2016 along with the Glenwood Police Department, Pope County Sheriff's Office, and the Minnesota State Patrol in Pope County.

The Minnesota Department of Public Safety's Office of Traffic Safety conducts six enforcement mobilizations involving approximately 350 participating law enforcement personnel throughout the year. The mobilizations focus on seat belt, speed, and impaired driving enforcement. In addition, two one-day enforcement campaigns focus on distracted driving and on enforcing Minnesota's Ted Foss Move Over Law.

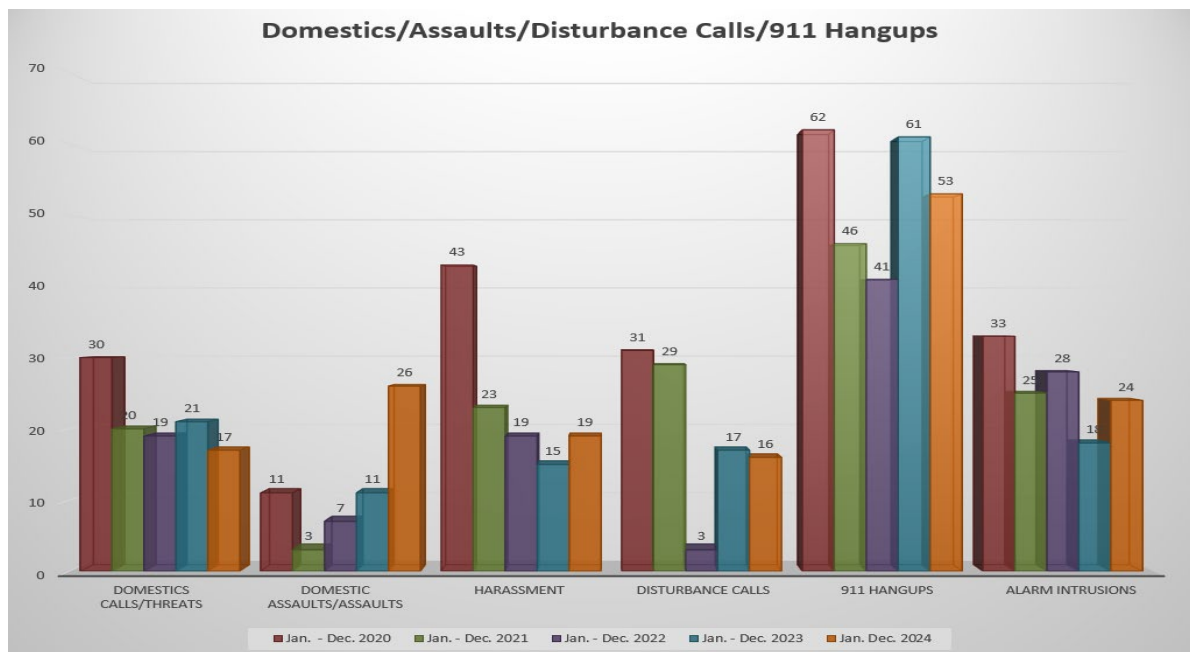
- **Click it or Ticket:** Occurs in April, May, and October
- **Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over:** Occurs in December and mid-August through early September.

- **Speed Enforcement:** Occurs in June and July
- **Distracted Driving:** Occurs one day in mid-April.
- **Move Over:** Occurs on August 31 (the anniversary of the date Trooper Ted Foss was killed because of a motorist not moving over for an emergency vehicle)

Research has consistently shown that enforcement efforts do not have a lasting effect on drivers' behavior if most of the public is unaware of them. Combining increased enforcement activity with adequate public awareness efforts can result in long-lasting improvements in driver behavior.

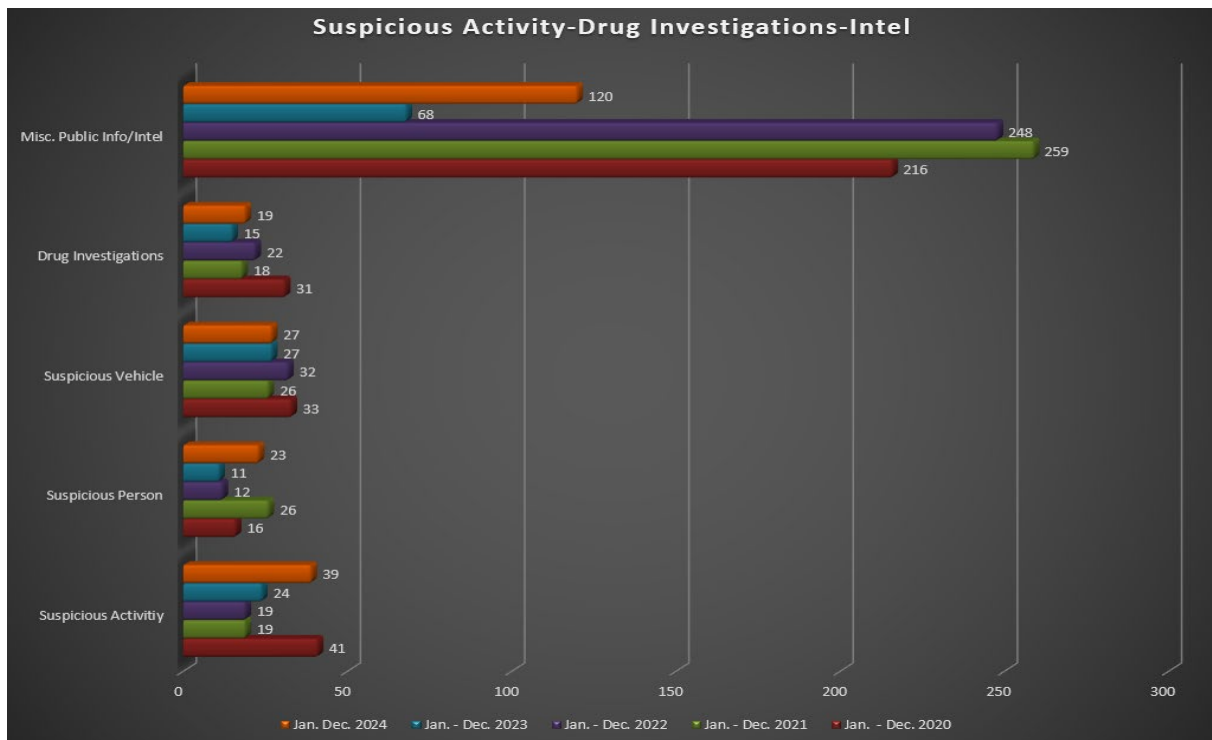
Domestic/Disturbance Calls

We have experienced a increase in reports of Domestic Disturbance and Domestic Assault in 2024. Our calls for Domestic Assaults increased from 21 in 2023 to 26 complaints in 2024. The department continues to work closely with the Pope County Attorney's Office, Someplace Safe, and Pope County Human Services in these cases.



Suspicious Activity & Drug Investigations

In 2024 we had a increase of drug investigations from 15 in 2023 to 19 in 2024, which some of them are still on going and we are currently working with the West Central Drug and Violent Crimes Task Force on these investigations. Out of the 15 drug investigations 3 of them stemmed from traffic stops, and the others from suspicious activity reports received from the public and officer self-initiated investigations.



We had 89 calls of some sort of suspicious activity happening in the City of Starbuck, which 3 of those calls ended up in criminal investigations and arrests, and some of the others led to ongoing drug investigations. So, we strongly encourage the community to continue reporting any type of suspicious activity as it has proven to be effective to deter criminal activity in our city.

Starbuck Police Department Arrests

Overall, the Starbuck Police Department had 2550 incidents, and out of those calls-for-service 47 incidents were cleared by arrest, which 46% of those arrests were traffic citations, 30% were arrests that stemmed from drug investigations, domestic assaults, and suspicious activity calls. The other 24% of the arrests were from arrest warrants, thefts, harassment complaints, and other criminal investigations.



Community Involvement

The Starbuck Police Department continues to be highly active in and involved in the community. Officers are currently involved in several Community Policing Engagements to include:

In addition, as the Chief of Police I am member of the Minnesota Chief of Police (MCPA) Association Board Director, and currently the MCPA Region 4 President (3rd Year), West Central SWAT Board and Team, West Central Drug and Violent Crimes Task Force Board of Directors, Association of Minnesota Emergency Mangers (AMEM), Pope County Community Leaders, Toward Zero Death (TZD) Steering Committee, TZD Fiscal Agent for Pope County, Minnewaska Area Schools Crisis Team, Pope County Mental Health Coalition, and the Pope County Criminal Justice Workgroup.

Training

Police Officers must put their life on the line occasionally, but they make life and death decisions on a regular basis. They also make decisions on whether or not to take away someone's freedom by incarcerating them. Proper training is paramount to the successful delivery of effective service to the community. Starbuck Police Officers are trained to the highest level possible while staying within budget constraints. Last year your officers received countless hours of training in areas ranging from Active Shooter to Crisis Intervention and many other things in between. Proper training is related to quality delivery of service to the community and minimizes potential for litigation. Officers attended the following courses in 2023:
